“Can’t Wait For Sunday”

Greetings Carmel Church Family,

Have you ever lamented (cried out to God) about the fallen culture, divided nation, broken families, immoral entertainment, corrupt politics, or anything else that is contrary to God’s good design in our world? Do you ever wonder where God is in all of this? Why doesn’t he turn the tide, or bring revival and have a national Kum-Ba-Yah moment? Why does God allow all of this evil to continually gain ground when there are many devout followers of Jesus in this country? How are we called to live in this environment? While we might be tempted to fight back, shout in the streets, announce condemnation on the wicked and seek revenge when “our side” is in power, how does God call us to live?

To answer that question, let me tell you the story of Habakkuk. Habakkuk is a prophet that wrote the Old Testament book bearing his name and lived during the wicked decline of Israel before the exile. The book of Habakkuk is not a prophecy against Israel, but rather a conversation between Habakkuk and God. He begins by lamenting (crying out to God) about the national division, political corruption, the injustices, immoral failings of Israel that rejected God and turned to idols. Does any of that sound familiar? The reality was that not all of Israel rejected God, but rather the power-hungry leaders willingly led many to reject God and His laws.

God’s answer does not sit well with Habakkuk. First, God tells Habakkuk that He sees the corruption and disobedience of the leaders of Israel. Then God says He will pour out His judgment upon the whole nation of Israel (not just the evil ones) by giving them over to the Babylonians. (Exile) Habakkuk, confused and angry argues that the Babylonians are even more evil and corrupt than Israel, why would He allow them to gain power over Israel, especially those who trusted in God?

God’s response to Habakkuk is the message that we need to hear today.

Habakkuk 2:4b “The righteous will live by faith.”

God promises Habakkuk that He will pour out judgment on Babylon and all corrupt nations and leaders in His perfect timing. The evil will not win forever, but how are God’s people to live during these confusing times? His answer is simply, “The righteous will live by faith.” We are to live by faith knowing that God sees us, knows our hearts, and will not leave us, nor forsake us.

For it is by grace we are saved (declared righteous) **through faith**, not by works as it says in Eph. 2:8-9. We are made righteous through faith in Christ and that is also how we are to live. We are called to walk by faith, not by sight. By faith, we reject the temptation to lie to get ahead, like those around us. By faith, we seek God and strive to live by His standards, not the world’s. Our righteousness does not

come from our obedience, but Christ's obedience to death on the cross. Our righteousness comes through faith in Jesus and we are called to continue to walk in that faith during all trials and tribulations. We walk by faith by giving up our plans and submitting to God's perfect plan, even when it means we will not be comfortable. We live by faith, knowing that God will punish sin, once for all in His perfect timing, not ours.

How do we live, raise kids, work, engage in our communities within our current culture? By faith. The righteous will live by faith in the One who died for our sins, while we were still sinners. The righteous will live by faith in the One who promises forgiveness, grace, and mercy through trust in Jesus. The righteous will live by faith knowing that during confusion, darkness, and chaos, we can rejoice in the Lord.

Habakkuk chapter 3 is a beautiful prayer in response to God's call to live by faith in the chaos. He writes that although things look bleak and out of control;

Yet I will rejoice in the Lord; I will take joy in the God of my salvation. Habakkuk 3:18

We can learn from Habakkuk's conversation with God. It is good to cry out to God, to lament about what we see in our world. Lay your fears, worries, future, concerns and anxiety at the feet of Jesus. God's answer to you might very well be His answer to Habakkuk, "The righteous will live by faith." Live by faith my friends and know that God is not only in control of the future, He is also in control of the present.

PLANNED IMPROVEMENTS TO THE CARMEL CEMETERY

We would like to inform the congregation about anticipated improvements to the Church Cemetery. We as the Cemetery Committee have decided it is time to expand the Cemetery as well as make a few additional changes.

First, because most of the plots available have been purchased, we have decided to extend the cemetery approximately 115 feet to the north. This section has recently been seeded to grass. Once the lawn is well established, we will begin the process of creating a grid, marking out this section for future plots.

Also, most of the existing trees are either rotting, damaged, or dying. Our plan is to remove all of the trees on the north end (the 4 large maple trees and 7 evergreen trees). If anyone is interested in getting some of the trees for firewood, please contact one of the Cemetery Committee members. After removing these trees, we hope to create at least one (possibly 2) gazebo seating areas. This will hopefully provide greater comfort and privacy for anyone who may want to spend extra time out there in reflection.

We will also be removing the fence that surrounds the Cemetery. It is in constant need of repair and a nuisance to mow around. In place of the fence on the eastern border as well as the northern border (new section), we intend to plant a row of evergreen trees to establish a border around the Cemetery. We hope this will provided for the needs of the church well into the future. We appreciate your support throughout this project.

When a mother asked her child how he'd fallen out of bed, he replied, "I guess I stayed too close to where I got in."

When we Christians fail to grow in prayer and discernment, knowledge and understanding of Scripture, generosity and other fruits of the Spirit, it's as if we're balancing precariously at the edge of the bed. It's quite easy to fall out — out of faith, out of church, out of active relationship with God.

A good practice, for sleeping and for our Christian faith, is to be careful not to stay too close to where we got in!

APPRECIATING YOUR PASTOR

Many people have complex relationships with their pastors because faith, church and God involve a mix of emotions. We have particular ideas about church practices, congregational priorities, the minister's use of time, money, authority and more.

But most pastors are deeply devoted to Christ and believe that God has called them to serve in a certain place. They have the best of intentions and work hard to share the good news of the gospel. So in honor of Pastor Appreciation Month in October, consider the following:

God doesn't call the qualified; he qualifies the called. Your pastor may need time to learn and develop certain skills. (Everyone does!) Bless pastors with your patience.

We don't change the message; the message changes us. You probably won't like all your pastor's sermons or newsletter columns. But instead of complaining, ponder that something may rub you the wrong way because God is trying to change you. Keep an open mind and heart.

If a church wants a "better" pastor, it just needs to pray for the one it has. Pray often and caringly for your pastors, church leaders and their families. The role is challenging, so support them spiritually and ask God to reveal his love and grace to these special servants.

LESSONS FROM LILIES

Recently I was challenged to think about what consumes me — and what distracts me from giving God more. In Matthew 6:25-34, Jesus tells us not to worry about what we eat, drink and wear. I've read those verses numerous times and usually respond, "Yeah, but the birds and lilies don't have mortgages and bills! How can I not worry?" I'm finally realizing that if I put Christ first, then my trust in him affects my day-to-day decisions. Plus, negative thoughts start to fade.

When do you respond, "Yeah, but ..." to God? Maybe it's when you want to sleep in on Sunday, or when the offering plate is passed, or when you're asked to teach Sunday school. Try reciting Matthew 6:33 often: "But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you" (ESV). When we prioritize Jesus, he guides us toward him and away from worries.

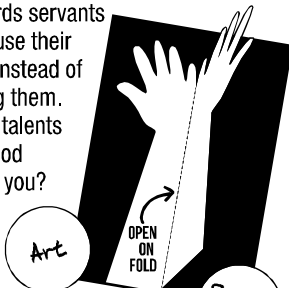

What you need:

- Construction paper (2 sheets)
- Pencil
