ALASKAN EXPERIENCE

As there is reflect on the experience, realization that nothing could have truly prepared us for what Alaska had in store. My expectations, shaped by stories and photos, fell short of the reality that unfolded before me. When asked to describe the Alaska trip, many in our group used words like *majestic*, *amazing* and *unexplainable*—and I couldn't agree more. It's a place where even the most breathtaking photographs fail to capture the essence of what you're seeing.

The work we did in Alaska was not always easy, but the payoff was more than worth it. Witnessing the expressions on the faces of both staff and students when the job was complete was truly rewarding. Their excitement and anticipation for what's to come in the newly transformed spaces was unmistakable. It was inspiring to see how physical labor, paired with purpose, could create such meaningful change. Alaska itself was breathtaking, but the real beauty was in the people, the mission, and the shared sense of accomplishment.

Another aspect of the trip that deeply impacted us was learning how we support Cody and Tricia in their ministry. They serve as full-time missionaries at the Alaska Bible Institute, and like the rest of the staff, they are not salaried. Their financial support comes entirely from churches and individuals who believe in the mission—churches like Carmel Church, which Tricia actively reaches out to for partnership.

Currently, Cody and Tricia are not fully funded and need more to get there. To help bridge the gap, Cody works a part-time job in addition to his ministry responsibilities. This reality highlights the dedication and sacrifice involved in their calling, and it gave us a deeper appreciation for the importance of consistent and generous support from the broader faith community.

Alaska Bible Institute (ABI) operates as a tuition-free, non-accredited Christian educational institution. This model is intentionally designed to make biblical education accessible to a wide range of students without the financial burden typically associated with higher education.

Because ABI does not charge tuition, it does not pursue accreditation. Accreditation would require the institute to implement tuition fees, which would in turn necessitate salaried compensation for staff members. As a result, individuals such as Cody and Tricia serve in unpaid roles, likely supported through personal fundraising or external sponsorship.

Students at ABI are responsible only for housing costs, and the campus can accommodate up to 45 residents. The program typically spans 2 to 3 years, and the student body is diverse, ranging in age from 18 to 50. Despite the lack of accreditation, ABI has not encountered challenges with students transferring to other institutions.

This approach reflects ABI's commitment to ministry-focused education, prioritizing spiritual formation and community over formal academic credentials.

The ABI program deeply impacted many of the students through its strong emphasis on faith. Students are not only educated but also discipled and prepared for missionary work. Tanner, a former student, now serves with his family in a nearby village, living out his calling. Cody and Tricia, who mentor current students, shared a powerful testimony of trusting God during financial hardship—receiving unexpected support from Carmel Church just when they needed it most. Their story, and their gratitude for the Carmel Church family's support, highlights how faith and community are central to the mission of ABI.

In closing, it's one thing to hear Cody and Tricia share their story at Carmel Church and to listen to those who have supported their journey recount their experiences. Their words paint a vivid picture of the work being done at ABI, and the impact it's having. But there's something profoundly different about stepping into that story yourself—seeing the mission in action, feeling the heartbeat of the community, and being part of something greater. If you've ever felt a tug to go deeper, to serve, or simply to witness what God is doing in Alaska, consider this your invitation. The door is open.

A DAY TO HONOR OUR VETERANS

On November 11, 1918, the Germans and the Allied Nations, which included the United States, signed a document to initiate an armistice (cessation of hostilities), thus ending World War I. A year later, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation designating November 11 as Armistice Day. It was to be a day of reflection-a day to remember those who died in the country's service and to offer Americans the opportunity "to show sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations".

Wanting to recognize more specifically America's veterans, Congress passed a bill changing the name of the day from Armistice Day to Veterans Day. The change was made in May 1954.

On this national holiday, churches around the nation hold service of prayers and praise. Followers of the Prince of Peace pray for peace among the nations of Earth and the day when "they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more" (Isaiah 2:4, NRSV).





Celebrate the season of gratitude by creating a colorful Thankful decoration.

What you need:

- Construction paper in a variety of fall colors
- Pencil, marker, or crayons
- Yarn, ribbon, or raffia
- Scissors
- Hole punch
- Spray bottle filled with water
- Real leaves (Optional)
- Wooden or plastic beads,
 cereal with holes (Cheerios,
 Froot Loops, etc.), or any
 dried pasta with a hole (Optional)

What you do:

- Draw or trace leaf shapes onto construction paper.
- Lay the paper flat and spray with water until the paper is completely wet
- 3. Crumple the wet paper into balls.
- 4. Open the paper and let the sheets dry flat.
